September LWI Meeting

We welcomed back Ann Marcer, who spoke to us previously about teaching in Tibet. After a short delay due to technical issues, Ann was able to start her talk — albeit differently from what she had hoped: her prepared presentation would not open on her laptop, so she instead had to talk to us on the fly, taking us through her photos of Kathmandu.

We learned about the very interesting history of Kathmandu, which actually comprises three cities, housing some 1.5 million people in total. This division dates back to a former king with three sons, who could not decide which of them should inherit the city. Each son built his own palace and monuments, trying to outdo the others.

Hindus, Buddhist and Christians live side by side, with no religious fighting. Tourism provides a very important income to Nepal. The 2015 earthquake destroyed many temples and houses, but the temples are so important to the Nepalese, both spiritually and economically, that they quickly began restoring them to their original appearance, including the many beautiful and intricate carvings. We also learned about the beautiful prayer flags & wheels.

We were pleased to hear from Ann that some of the girls she taught had themselves forged careers as teachers. Ann talked us through all her photos, and then answered a range of questions from the floor. 

Continuing the theme of members' holiday snaps, Monique has kindly shared some photos of her recent trip to Paxos, one of the small Greek islands. It looks fabulous!



Poppy Knitting Pattern

Abbreviations:

K knit; **K2tog** knit next 2 stitches together; **K** knit into front and back of stitch; **P** purl;

P2tog purl next 2 stitches together; **Rem** remaining; **Rep** repeat; **RS** right side;

ssk slip 2 stitches knitwise, knit these 2 stitches together through back loops – single left leaning decrease; **st** stitch; **tbl** through back loop; **WS** wrong side; * repeat the instructions following the single asterisk as directed

Using 4mm needles, cast on 66 stitches using red yarn.

R1 (RS) K3, p4*k4,p4; rep from * to last 3 sts, k3.

R2 (WS) P3, k4*p4,k4; rep from * to last 3 sts, p3.

Rows 3 to 8: rep last 2 rows 3 more times

R9 (RS) K1, k2tog,p2tog tbl. *ssk,k2tog,p2tog, p2tog tbl; rep from * to last 3 sts,ssk, K1. (should have 34 stitches)

R10 P2,*k2,p2; rep from * to end.

R11 K2tog, *p2tog,k2tog; rep from * to end. (should have 17 stitches)

R12 P1,*p2tog; rep from * to end. (should have 9 stitches).

To make up poppy, break the yarn leaving approx. 20cm tail. Weave the tail through the remaining stitches and gather together to create the poppy centre then fasten off. Join the side seam using mattress stitch.

To make the poppy centre, either use a black button or cast on 2 stitches in black yarn.

R1 (RS) K_ twice (4 stitches)

R2 P4

R3 K4

R4 P4

R5 K2tog twice, slip first stitch over second and fasten off. Sew into poppy centre.

Sue also has another pattern (for knitting or crochet) using a wrap and turn technique for short rows. Copies of both patterns will be brought to the next meeting.
